BEYOND ChatGPT:

Strategic AI Into Effective and Engaging Teaching

hatGPT offers a potential number of opportunities and challenges when it comes to teaching—ranging from an instant online editor, source of information, ideas generator, assessment assistant, and many more. Well, the truth is AI indeed comes in more different ways. In essence, AI aims to perform tasks that human intelligence can do by learning, solving problems, and interacting with natural language based on input we give and platforms that have integrated such technology. There are already available free tools different from ChatGPT that can be easily used as chatbots, virtual assistants, and content generators in class. We just need to figure out how to dive into this new ocean of possibilities by learning how to surfits waves and navigate through upcoming challenges such as demanding students and our always-changing reality. In this short article, you can find some ideas and resources to try yourself and decide whether or not they add to or detract from your class.



Spice up your Lessons by Engaging Students Actively

Interactive and audience platforms that incorporate polls, instant drawing, word clouds, Q&A sessions, and interactive quizzes are a great way to engage students and gather audience feedback. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, they seemed quite innovative, but now, platforms like MENTIEMETER, NEARPOD, and SLIDO are part of the toolbox of teachers who teach remotely or on-site. CURIPOD's AI tools are designed to boost teacher's instruction before or while teaching. Compared to the previously mentioned platforms, this one has worked for free up until now, and it does not have a limit of slides or features to access. A whole lesson can be generated with both input and output activities. Content slides can be designed either by AI or yourself including hooks, identifying existing knowledge, intriguing discussions, or event tests; you can easily save yourself some time and spice up the flow of your lesson. It also features SEL ideas and activities to take a meaningful break or just check in anytime. In addition to all this, it also comes with inclass projects, assessments, and feedback ideas aligned to the development of global skills that can be done in just a matter of seconds. Although facts need to be factchecked, and some slides may need editing, this tool is handy and appealing for adding fun to your lessons without having to pay or feeling limited or that your whole lesson depends on AI.

Max out your Files and Writing Projects

Students formerly have learned the profound impact and practicality that ChatGPT has when it comes to writing and editing. As teachers, we have seen AI generative text applied to emails, reports, and essays. Fortunately, by being aware of this we can both resort to online AI detectors and most importantly, we can remind students of the importance of stressing the human loop when resorting to AI. While AI in education serves to personalized learning, automation,

scalability, and data-driven insight, human educators can give emotional and social support, complex problem-solving guidance, and motivation and inspiration that AI just cannot (yet). By encouraging students to use ChatGPT wisely, they can make decisions by themselves and come up with an original product. Either in the stage of prewriting, proofreading, or editing, learners can apprehend what good writing is, and what is expected from them as English users when it comes to effective and accurate writing communication. Without just generating AI text instantly, students can learn within the process by improving on aspects like proofreading word choice, and citing. One of the best actions to take is to use the already-integrated AI in GOOGLE DOCS and GOOGLE SLIDES. Google Workspace Labs has enabled the 'Help Me Write' tool, which works just by typing prompts within an icon (pencil) and textbox that is displayed in the document. That way a document can be considered human-made or at least human-oriented, as well as high-quality; what is more, EFL students can learn for real about academic writing, corporate English, and adapting a proper register to the situation they will eventually face in real life.

Quick Visuals with Impact

Sometimes projects take good timing from our students and class, especially when it is time to present or socialize them. Now there are online and friendly-user generators that design visuals in just a matter of seconds. Also known as DALL-E, these text-to-image models work just by entering prompts.

BING IMAGE CREATOR is a very professional example powered by Microsoft. It creates best when you write descriptively. So, students just need to be creative and add details: adjectives, locations, and even art styles. Images created come in handy for presentations and speaking activities as pictures can come up in professional, surprising, and thought-provoking ways. If you are teaching business English or one of your projects is a business idea or event, LOOKA is quite practical. It combines design preferences with AI to make neat logos and slogans free of watermarks. Last, CANVA added in October MAGIC STUDIO, which is basically an AI that assists designers in creating custom, onbrand, and attention-grabbing content in seconds. In just one platform, text and images can be generated, and even videos can be edited in an instant. The first couple of times, it takes a bit of time in class to use these apps and platforms, but once students get it, they even start using it on their own.

Dynamize Lesson Planning and Assessment

Lesson Planning and assessment is an everyday job that requires proper observation, guidance, and creativity; particularly in demanding and challenging environments like ours. TEACHER-TOOLS.AI comes with three amazing tools. The first one is to generate multiple-choice tests just by entering a topic and age group. Quizzes have always been a good option to put our students on the test, literally. What takes time is creating them but with this saving-time tool, they can be easily adapted






onto Google Forms, WordWall, Quizziz, and Kahhot. The second and third features allow you to create a script for a lesson taught by a celebrity, or a debate with any avatar you choose; both scripts can be copypasted and heard out loud, therefore, they can be used as listening or reading input. AI QUIZ MAKER is another website that gives you the chance to paste any text and generate a 4 multiple-choice interactive text that students can take just by clicking on its weblink. Last, but not least, KAHOOT and QUIZZIZ now work likewise, they generate brand-new interactive quizzes made out of existing files (DOC, PDF, PPT, YouTube Video). In a nutshell, it is all about using our knowledge and skills sensibly to make this tool run smoothly since all of the questions and text created need to be checked for accuracy and appropriateness.

Chatbots

Although ChatGPT can be used as an interactive chatbot to practice English, there are two other options to resort to. On one hand, there is HELLO HISTORY, which is an app that empowers its users to chat with historical figures, ideal for advanced students and classes that use history as a means to build inspiration and knowledge: although it comes just with 20 messages, they are reset once the app is de-installed. On the other hand, KUKI, which was originally designed for the Metaverse, is a

bot that allows you to start and keep basic interaction. Its work is still in development, but its intelligence includes the ability to reason with specific objects. However, depending on the complexity of the interaction, sometimes the talk gets stuck. Motivating, yet lacking that human touch, these resources wisely used are simply mind-blowing.




